Conclusion:

The most frequently used words give the subject: "But not love".

This text contains more negative statements than positive ones.

The lack of love AND what love is not, reveals a need.

There are NO imperative verbs. The application is left to the reader.

Natural divisions by frequent use of certain words:

vs1-3 Have love vs4-8a Love is not vs8b-12 I will know v13 Love

Some questions to ask this text:

- 1) How should we love?
- 2) How can we recognize a lack of true love?
- 3) How is knowledge limited?
- 4) How important is love?

"There is only one interpretation, but many applications":

- 1) Do I have love?
- 2) Is my love true love?
- 3) Have I grown up in love?
- 4) Is loving a priority in my life?
- 5) etc.
