## Survey of the Book of Acts

- 1. The writer: The name of Luke does not appear in the book, but his hand is obvious. He was a physician (Col4v14) with an eye for medical details (3v2, 7-8, 4v22, 9v18, 12v23 et cetera). The passages (Ac16v10, 20v5-15, 21v1-18, etc.) where he speaks of himself (86x) coincide with the remarks of Paul about Luke (Col4v14, 2Tim4v11 & Phm24). The prologue refers to the Gospel he wrote (cf. Ac1v1 & Luke 1v3) as a clear indication that Luke is also the writer of this book.
- 2. The date: This book was written after the Gospel according to Luke (cf. Ac1v1 & Luke 1v3), but before the destruction of Jerusalem in 70 AD (28v17-21). Paul is still in prison for the first time in Rome (28v30) and there is no mention of the great fire in that city (64 AD) so it is probable that Luke wrote from 59-61 AD.
- 3. The readers: Luke wrote this for Theophilus (1v1) who was a nobleman (Lu1v3). He takes the time to describe places (1v12, 18-19, etc.) and explain customs (2v5, 3v1, etc.) for a reader who might miss these important details. There is a tone of defense of the Gospel and of the first Christians who were so unjustly persecuted (1v3, 2v15, 32, 3v12, 4v9-10, 21, 25, 5v28-29, etc.)
- 4. The divisions: The Lord Jesus Christ offers us the outline of this book in Ac1v8.

My witnesses in Judea and Samaria, ch8-9

My witnesses in all the world, ch10-28

5. The key word: Witness(es) 33x

The Greek word for witness is "martyr" because a "witness" in a Roman court who was condemned for telling a lie paid for it with his or her's life. That is why Steven was stoned, because they judged him as a false witness, even though we know he was not. Steven was the first "martyr" of the church.

There is no such thing as a "silent witness" in any court. The key verse of the book is Acts 1v8, "You shall be my witnesses". We need to speak up about Christ did for us.

- 6. The message: A true witness never changes his story (cf. 4v20, 5v28-29 & 7v1).
- 7. The application: May my actions match my words (4v13).
