## The book of Titus

- 1. The writer: Paul, the apostle (1:1) had brought Titus to the Lord (1:4) and discipled him to serve the Lord (1:5). Paul had the spiritual gift required to be a missionary (Ep4:11). He was a true sent servant (Jn13:16). He was sent to the "gentile" nations, rather than Israel (Ep3:8 & Ga2:8). He went to the pagan island of Crete (1:5) but, left Titus to finish the work. So he was a true "apostle" because the spiritual gift was not limited to the first "twelve" (of whom one is in Hell today! Cf Jn17:12) because we read of many other apostles (Ac14:4, 14, 1Cor15:7, Ga1:1 & 17).
- 2. The date: It seems this was written between the 1<sup>st</sup> letter to Timothy and the 2<sup>nd</sup>, the latter being written in 62 AD. Paul is probably in Macedonia (3:12) after evangelizing Crete (1:5) and is on his way to Rome as a prisoner (Ac27:7-11 & 21) in 59 AD. Paul had enough freedom and time to write (Ac27:3). But, he had to leave Titus in Crete when the centurion took him off to Rome (Ac27:9 & 12-13). Paul was released from Rome in 61 AD.
- 3. The readers: Titus, of Greek origin (Ga2:3), had been led to the Lord by Paul (1:4). He often accompanied Paul (Ga2:1, 2Cor2:12, 7:6-7 & 13-17). Paul had often sent him on a mission (2Cor8:6, 18, 23, 12:18, 2Tim4:10) because he had the heart for it (2Cor8:16). He seems to be a young man (2:6-7).
- 4. The natural divisions: Four wishes of Paul -
  - 1:1-4 That the grace and peace of the Lord...
  - 1:5-16 That you would set in order...
  - 2:1-15 That no one despise you...
  - 3:1-15 That they would pratcice...
- 5. The key repeated words: "That" + a verb in the subjunctive, 18x
- 6. The message: "that you would set in order what remains" (1:5)
- 7. The application: Every Christian assembly of believers (church) needs to follow the New Testament biblical order, being led by qualified "elders" well recognized by all. [Notice how this is a very personal letter (1:5) but, to be read by all (3:15).]
